

From the Desk of the Executive Director

Two recent announcements from the *Ministry of Health and Long-term Care* are good news for long-term care homes in general and Nisbet Lodge in particular. This summer the Honorable George Smitherman announced a significant increase

in the amount for raw food in the province's long-term care homes from \$5.57 to \$7.00 per day. This was the result of a lot of lobbying by various groups from the Ontario Association of Non-Profit Homes and Services for Seniors (OANHSS) to the Family Council Network. This move will enable homes to provide things like more fresh fruit and better quality meals. It will also allow them to meet the increasingly specialized diets residents require because of their age or medical

condition. According to Donna Rubin, CEO of OANHSS, "Homes have always met the basic nutritional needs of residents but a 26 per cent increase will make a real difference." This change came into effect September 1.

The second announcement by the Minister had to do with the redevelopment of the province's 35,000 older long-term care beds. The plan, while still subject to cabinet approval, calls for the renewal of 3,500 beds a year over a ten-year period. This will mean that there is consistent, high quality accommodation across the province both now and in the future.

This is really good news for Nisbet Lodge, which was formally designated a C facility. Homes were rated a number of years ago on how the physical layout of the building fit with new Ministry design standards. This program is planned to begin in 2008, which will give added impetus for Nisbet's Strategic Planning Committee to move its redevelopment plan forward.

You know, sometimes elections are a good thing!

the School Board for 18 years as a child care worker with emotionally disturbed children. Mary Keane came to work as a nurse at Nisbet Lodge when it first opened as a retirement home 35 years ago. She has many memories of her employment at the Lodge

Harry Keane came to Canada from Glasgow, Scotland in 1951. Harry was a sailor for many years, sailing the great lakes since 1951. With 3 small children at home, Mr. Keane returned to college to become a Ship Captain. For 25 years Harry worked for the Metro Parks and Recreation as the Captain of the "Sam McBride" ferry, taking people to and from the Toronto Islands. Mr. Keanes' hobbies included making cement statues of the Blessed Mother; you can see his work on display in the garden at Holy Name Church.

It was on a stopover in Toronto in 1957 that Harry and Mary met at a Community Dance run by the Church. They were married one year later. They have 2 sons and 1 daughter and 7 grandchildren. They have been happily married for 48 years. Prior to living at McClintock Manor they were local residents living on Browning Ave for 35 years.

Mr & Mrs Keane have been involved with Calvary Church for many years. All of the Keane children participated with programs at Calvary and this continues with their son Tom and his family, who are regular members of Calvary Church.

Both Mr. & Mrs. Keane are long time volunteers. Mary Keane has volunteered for over 50 years with the Alzheimer Society. On June 4th of this year, Mary Keane was invited to enjoy High Tea with Princess Anne, the Sister of Queen Elizabeth; this special event was to honour and recognize the many long term Alzheimer Society volunteers.

Mary & Harry Keane moved to McClintock Manor in June of 2006 and can often be seen enjoying their afternoon coffee in the Manor lobby while chatting with neighbours and friends.

Ruby Thompson Nisbet Lodge Resident



Born in Aberdeen Scotland, Ruby was the fourth of eight children. After completing high school she began working at a spinning mill. She recalls working long hours for f2.10 a week! She liked

to go dancing to the Fox Trot and Quick Step with her girlfriends. "I can't do that now, I'd break my hip".

Ruby left for Canada in September of 1953. A month after her arrival she married her fiancé Frank. Her first job in Canada was at Simpson's Departmental Store in the furniture department. She eventually left to have children. Her son lives in Toronto and her daughter in the USA. She has 4 lovely grand children that she adores.

Frank and Ruby bought a house at 69 Leroy Ave. (Mortimer/ Greenwood area) and lived there for fifty-two years! She still liked to dance but raising a family did not allow much time so she took up gardening.

Ruby said she has never gone back to her home country but keeps in contact with her sisters and brothers in Scotland; all but one is still alive.
