Accreditation Canada

One of our main priorities over the next year is getting ready for accreditation, which is set for June of 2009. After a review of the two accrediting bodies, the Board decided to go with Accreditation Canada. This is the same independent body that accredits hospitals. Nisbet has been accredited with Accreditation Canada since 1998.

Accreditation is something that organizations choose to do. While we have Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care standards that we follow, they are considered minimum standards. Accreditation allows organizations to raise the bar when it comes to quality by measuring our performance against

nationally accepted standards. It also lets the public know that we run a good home.

The teams are now in place and represent the following areas: Sustainable Governance, Long-Term Care Services, Managing Medications, Infection Prevention and Control and Effective Organization. This last group also includes Worklife Pulse and Patient Safety.

The next step will be to complete surveys for each area and when the results come in start building on those standards that require strengthening in readiness for the surveyors' visit next spring.

The Sharkey Report

The Sharkey Report on staffing and care standards in long-term care homes was released in July. There were eleven recommendations meant to address these two main goals: one is to strengthen the staff capacity for better care and second to establish a strong foundation for quality care and accountability. government has committed to increasing staffing to 3.5 hours of care per day by 2011. Homes have received funding for an additional Registered Practical Nurse (RPN) and some additional Personal Worker (PSW) hours. At Nisbet, the RPN position was added on nights and the PSW hours were used to top up two short shifts on days. While most homes would say that the 3.5 hours are needed now this is a welcome fist step.

One of our newer tenants, Melpo Pedias, recently passed away. She had lived on Strathmore Avenue prior to moving into the Manor. Melpo was a woman of prayer and an active member of the Greek Gospel Church. David Anastansiadis was a long time friend of Melpo's. She was an avid reader and came across a book in the Manor library entitled 'The Autobiography of George Muller.'

Muller was a man of faith and worked with orphans in the slums of London during the 1800's. She shared this book with David. He was so struck by its message that he bought fifty copies for the tenants in memory of his good friend Melpo Pedias.

One of the priority areas from the most recent Tenant Satisfaction Survey was improving building security. While this area is generally safe, thieves sometimes target senior's buildings. As a proactive measure a new high security lock system has been installed at the main door. This makes use of a computerized key fob rather than a key. One of the good

features about this system is that if a fob is lost the code is taken out of the system and cannot be used again.

From the Desk of the Executive Director

Recently some of the staff attended the Willow Creek Community Church's Leadership Summit. We were challenged by two of the speakers, Bono of the rock band U2 and Bill Hybels, Senior Pastor of Willowcreek Community Church, to consider getting our organizations involved in the fight

against disease and poverty in the developing world.

The Nisbet Lodge — McClintock Manor Foundation does fund-raising for many worthy projects that benefit our residents. What Bono and people like Stephen Lewis have pointed out is that while there is need at home, the scale of the situation is simply overwhelming.

It seemed to me that if we were going to do something as a long-term care home it should be senior to senior. I came

across an organization called Help the Aged Canada. They are the only registered Canadian charity dedicated exclusively to assisting the poor and destitute elderly people living in



developing countries and in Canada. They have many programs, from eye care in India to mobile medical clinics in the Congo. At home they support agencies like St. Christopher House, a settlement house here in Toronto.

One of their other programs is Adopt-A-Gran. Currently, they have started two homes for the elderly in Haiti and are looking for sponsors for their residents. Haiti, as you may know, is the least developed country in the Americas and has recently been devastated by floods.

I approached the Resident's Council about this project and they really liked the idea of getting involved. They have committed to sponsoring one senior in the hope that other individuals and groups will get behind this. The Council has offered to act as a liaison with the home in Haiti.

For more information, a representative from Help-the-Aged Canada will be doing a presentation here in October. If you would like to make a one time gift or sponsor a senior (\$27 month) simply make out a cheque to the Nisbet Lodge Resident's Council and indicate it is for the Haiti project.

The United Nations has declared October 1 as the International Day of the Older Person. What better way to celebrate than to support this small project of the Nisbet Lodge Resident's Council!


Doreen Mansell Nisbet Lodge Resident

She attended the Navigation Road School, which was a ten minute walk from home. Doreen later went to Bradbury High School and her favourite subject was sports. She loved playing field hockey and tennis. After graduating from high school she worked for a small company using a comptometer, which was a forerunner of the computer.

Doreen's passion for playing tennis lasted well into her eighties. It was while playing that she met the love of her life, Roy Mansell. He played for a short time at Wimbledon. When Roy returned from the war they tied the knot and had two daughters.

They eventually moved to Canada and lived in the Oakville area for many years. She volunteered for the Girl Guides and at the Oakville Hospital. An avid cat lover, she has gotten to know Nisbet's cat, Duchess. Doreen will celebrate her 92nd birthday on October 19th.

Jean was born in Rainy River, the northern terminus for the world's longest street, namely Yonge Street. She was the youngest of six children and grew up on a cattle farm. Jean fondly remembers "I enjoyed feeding the baby lambs when their mothers abandoned them, and the chickens."

She attended Sleeman Public School, which was then a one-room schoolhouse where the teacher taught all eight grades. "I don't know how they did it but I had fun at school." She went to Rainy River High School. After graduating she taught for a while but didn't like it so she enrolled in nursing at Fort William Hospital. After working nights for three years she decided she wanted more of a challenge and went to the University of Toronto and got her Bachelor's Degree in Health Sciences.

At one time nursing schools were attached to hospitals. She was part of a pilot project at George Brown College that led to nursing training shifting from the hospitals to the colleges. She continued to teach there until she retired.

Jean got married when she was 26 but never had children. She and her husband travelled extensively and both liked golf and biking. When asked if she would do anything differently, her reply was, "just more of the same, I enjoyed life."
